If you're on the winning side, you might hold out to relish in the thrill of victory. For the opposing side, might be a good time to join the tailgate, beat the traffic, or if watching on tv, change the channel.

Regardless of what side of the coin you're on, a blow-out makes headlines and record books. College football history books show the highest scoring collegiate football contest was Georgia Tech defeating Cumberland (TN) 222-0 on 10/17/1916 in Atlanta, GA. That's unreal yet impressive (for Georgia Tech). Of course, nowadays it would be considered poor sportsmanship for a coach to allow his team to score anywhere close to 100 points in a game.

Here are a few facts from the list:

- Grambling State, Florida A&M, and Yale have the most 50+ pts a game scoring at 89, 88, and 81 times, respectively.
- Yale and Harvard have the most 100+ pts in a game scoring at 4 times each; followed by Princeton and Idaho State at 3 times each.
- The closest margin of victory for a team scoring 50+ pts in a game is 18, with Wagner defeating Jacksonville, 62-44 in 1998.
- West Virginia Tech (NAIA) and Savannah State (MEAC) each suffered the most losses(3) on the list of high score blow-outs.
- The oldest high score blow-out occurred on 11/3/1886 (Harvard won); the most recent was on 11/6/2010 (Old Dominion won)

## 2. MULTI-TASKING 101

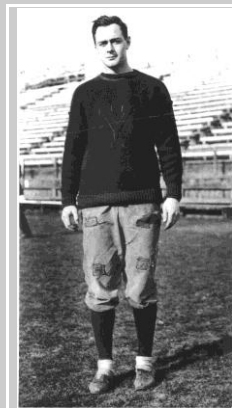
In an era where our country is facing high unemployment rates and job scarcity, it's hard enough keeping and maintaining gainful employment regardless of the profession. Adversely, throughout professional sports, we've witnessed players defeat the odds and cross lines to "make that paper" while balancing their beloved skill sets. Deion Sanders did it with the Atlanta Braves and Falcons in the early 90's; Bo(diddley) Jackson with the L.A. Raiders and K.C. Royals in the late 80's; Cliff Aberson even played for the Green Bay Packers while batting for the Chicago Cubs in the mid 40's. Former Richmond Spider safety, Brian Jordan, transitioned from the Atlanta Falcons to the St. Louis Cardinals in the early 90's. From the basketball ranks, Bill Russell played and coached a brief stint for the Boston Celtics in the 60's. And don't forget Brown University's Fritz Pollard, who played and coached the Akron Pros in 1921.

These guys played multiple sports and, the latter two, coaching the teams they played for. If that's not busy enough for you, what about coaching two football teams at the same time in different leagues?

Andrew McKillop and Ralph Hickok (via Joe Williams) recently contributed historical content to *The College Football Historian* (Aug 2011, vol4, no 7) depicting Nelson "Bud" Talbot and Aldo Donelli as being the firsts of coaching college and pro teams at the same time. Talbot played for Yale and coached University of Dayton and the Dayton Triangles of the American Professional Football Association (now NFL) in 1920 & 1921. A FIFA World Cup soccer player, Donelli played for Duquesne University and coached his alma mater while coaching the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1941.

One feather in Fordham's hat for now is that one of their "greats" now has a bowl named in his honor. The Lombardi Bowl will take place on 1/16/2012 and will showcase an FCS Senior All-Star game. This inaugural contest will be played at the Virginia Beach Sportsplex in Virginia Beach, VA. FCS players will be selected weekly in defense, offense, and special teams categories by The Sports Network.
